

names, or other distinguishing marks of a competitor) and, by misleading the customer, you cause him to buy something he would not otherwise have bought then there would also be a breach of the Consumer Protection from Unfair Trading Regulations 2008.

Selling films on video, DVD or Blu-ray is risky because the sale of films that have not been properly classified by the British Board of Film Classification can attract fines of up to £20,000 per tape or a prison sentence under the Video Recordings Act 1984. You are strongly advised to take more detailed advice on the Video Recordings Act before putting films out for sale.

Don't be fooled into selling bootleg music or films by the seeming informality of the setting. Even if it was not you who copied from the original, the Copyright, Designs and Patents Act 1988 provides for secondary infringement so long as you are benefiting from the exercise commercially and you know or have reason to believe that copyright had been infringed.
